Subject: Food Pantry Visitors Demographics and Success Rates, Winter and Spring 2024

OVERVIEW

The De Anza Food Pantry operates an on-campus pantry that distributes groceries and prepared foods and hosts a mobile food pantry in partnership with West Valley Community Services. The Pantry also operates numerous satellite locations across campus and distributes grocery gift cards and assists students with enrolling in the CalFresh cash assistance program for food, among other services. This report provides an overview of the students who visited the Food Pantry in winter or spring 2024. The data is disaggregated by international students with an FZ visa status and all other students, which are referred to as resident students.

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS:

- The Food Pantry served **693 students who visited 2,888 times in winter 2024 and 740 students who visited 3,385 times in spring 2024**.
- The majority of students (60%) who visit the Food Pantry are international students on an F1 visa.¹
- The majority of all Food Pantry visitors are continuing students followed by first-time students.
- Food Pantry visitors are well **distributed** between **female** (53%) and **male** (44%).
- A third of all visitors to the Food Pantry identify as low income while around 15% are first generation college students. When looking only at resident students, 64% identify as low income and 30% are first-generation college students.
- Resident students who visit the Food Pantry largely identify as Asian (60%) followed by Latinx (20%),
 white (8%) and Black (4%).
- Excluding international students, a quarter of resident students who visit the food pantry do not receive financial aid. Thus, there may be an opportunity to increase financial aid services at the Food Pantry locations.
- Course success rates are **very high across** all Food Pantry visitors at **89%**, with **resident students** having success rates **4 percentage points lower than international students**.
- There are not large differences in modality by residency status for students who visited the Food
 Pantry when looking at online and face to face modalities. The largest difference was for hybrid
 sections.

¹ The international student population is somewhat different than the resident student population; international students are predominantly enrolled full time, tend to identify as Asian or decline to state their ethnicity and tend to not identify as low income or first-generation status.

TOTAL FOOD PANTRY VISITS

In winter 2024, 693 unique students visited the Food Pantry 2,888 times, 4 times per quarter on average. In spring 2024, 740 unique students visited the Pantry 3,385 times 4.5 times per quarter on average. In total, 1,433 unique students visited the Food Pantry 6,273 times in winter and spring 2024. Of the 1,433 students, all but 58 students were enrolled during the timeframe, resulting in 2,198 enrollments in various course sections across the campus.

STUDENT CHARACTERISTICS AND DEMOGRAPHICS

- The majority of students (59%) who visit the Food Pantry are international students on an F1 visa.
- Most visitors are enrolled full time (75%). Though 50% of resident students who visit the Food Pantry are enrolled full time, which is more consistent with the overall student population.
- Around a third of all visitors to the Food Pantry identify as low income while around 15% are first generation college students. When looking at just domestic students, 64% identify as low income and 30% are first generation, consistent with the overall student population.
- 5% of visitors are enrolled in EOPS or DSPS programs.

• The majority of Food Pantry visitors are continuing students followed by first-time students. This is consistent for international and resident students and for the student population overall.

• Resident students who visit the Food Pantry largely identify as Asian (60%) followed by Latinx (20%), white (8%) and Black (4%). Compared to the overall student population, there is an overrepresentation of Asian students by 15% and an underrepresentation of Latinx students by 5%.

- The largest group of visitors to the Food Pantry have a prior education level that is not available in Banner. This is largely influenced by international students in the data.
- When looking at resident students, 68% are high school graduates while only 10% are All Other.

- The majority of visitors do not receive any financial aid, this again is influenced by international students who are not eligible for federal financial aid.
- Excluding international students, a quarter of resident students who visit the food pantry do not receive financial aid. Thus, there may be an opportunity to increase financial aid services at the Food Pantry locations.
- 13% of resident students who receive aid also receive a Pell grant.

• When separating international students from resident students, success rates remain high, with resident students exhibiting slightly lower success rates by 4 percentage points on average, and higher withdraw rates by 4 percentage points on average.

In order to explore differences in accessing on-campus food pantry services the data was disaggregated by instructional modality and residency status. There are not large differences in modality by residency status for students who visited the Food Pantry when looking at online and face to face modalities. The largest difference was for hybrid sections.

- International students enrolled in hybrid courses at higher rates than resident students with a 7-percentage point difference.
- Resident students enrolled in online courses at a slightly higher rate than international students, with a 4-percentage point difference.
- Differences in face-to-face modality were only 3 percentage points higher for resident students than international students.
