# **Course Description**

This is a fully online course with <u>NO Zoom meetings</u>, EWRT 1A is the first transfer-level composition course with an introduction to college level reading and writing, and an emphasis on analysis. Students in this course examine a variety of texts (personal, popular, literary, professional and academic) from culturally diverse traditions and practice common rhetorical strategies to compose clear, well-organized, and well-developed essays with varying purposes and differing audiences, from personal to academic.

- · Practice writing as a multi-step process including planning and revising with attention to varying purposes, audiences, and rhetorical strategies.
- · Read and analyze rhetorically and culturally diverse narrative and expository texts from a variety of perspectives.
