History 17C-59Z is an online class that does not have scheduled meetings. Students can log in any time to do the required week's course work. Students must have access to a computer, the internet, and an individual email address. We recommend a laptop or desktop computer to successfully complete the course; a tablet or phone may not be adequate for all assignments and tests. The class will use the Canvas course management system. See the <u>Student Online</u> <u>Resources hub</u> with extensive information and tips for online learning.

Course Description:

The United States is a country that has always been striving to define itself. This course will begin to explore that process of self-definition during the critical 20th century, when the United States made the transition from an isolationist economic power to an international superpower.

This survey will examine the progressive era, the tentative emergence of the United States as a world political leader during and after World War I, and the role of the Great Depression in American politics. We will look in depth at World War II and the role of the Cold War in elevating the United States into the position of a superpower. We will look at domestic unrest and the civil rights movements of the 1960s, the "malaise" of the 70s, the revival of patriotism and aggressive foreign policy in the 80s, the collapse of Communism, and the rise of political divisiveness in the 21st century.

Learning Outcomes: Students will demonstrate and apply knowledge of the 20th century U.S. to construct defensible statements of meaning and evaluation about this period's developments. Assessment: quizzes, exams, and papers.

Discussions. In order to have regular and substantive interaction (and to get to know each other), we will be holding discussions on the subject matter on designated weeks. You will need to keep up with the material regularly, and not just leave it to the end of the week.

You are responsible for posting at least four (4) substantive posts during the discussion week over the course of three (3) separate days in the week. DO NOT WAIT UNTIL SUNDAY TO DO THE DISCUSSION. See the <u>Discussion Instructions</u> for further details.

Primary source analysis papers. There will be <u>one</u> short primary source analysis paper due, as listed below. It will be devoted to analyzing primary sources, available from within the paper assignment. Typed, double-spaced, approximately 900-1100 words, to be submitted to the Canvas website. (See video instructions below.) The paper must be submitted by 11:59 pm on the date due. Do not submit Pages files, links, or other formats that Turnitin does not accept. If the file cannot be analyzed by Turnitin, you will receive no credit.

You will choose which subject on which you will write your paper: <u>America Enters the War, The Origins of the Cold War</u>, or <u>The Civil Rights Movement</u>. Each has different due dates, as listed below. Click on the links within the modules for the assignments and links to the primary sources. Each worth 30 points. You may turn in <u>only</u> one paper for credit. For help on MLA formatting, consult the <u>Purdue Owl</u>.

Team Presentation. Everyone will be part of a team and help to produce a presentation on the 1980s, focusing on a particular aspect of that era. The presentation is due November 24th. The

team charter (1 point), progress report (1 point), presentation (19 points), team evaluation (3 points) and comments on another team's presentation (1 point) add up to a total of 25 points for the Team Presentation project.

History in the news. In order to see the connections between the past and the present, you will be following the news over the course of the quarter and posting <u>two</u> articles and commenting on <u>two</u> articles other students have posted. Worth 4 points.

Final exam. The final will be held on **Monday, December 9th.** The final will consist of <u>one</u> essay question and <u>three</u> short identifications. A study guide will be provided one week ahead of the exam that will consist of four possible essay questions; the instructor will choose one of these for your final exam—you will not have a choice. You will have a choice on the short IDs, but these will only be available on the day of the exam. You will have 24 hours to complete and submit the exam to Turnitin via Canvas. Worth 20 points.

Assignment policies. Make-up discussion contributions and late papers will <u>not</u> be accepted. There is no "extra credit" in the course.

Note that no instructor-initiated "W" grades will be issued. It is your responsibility to drop the course in a timely manner if you choose to do so. The last day to drop the class is October 6th. The last day to withdraw is November 15th.

Plagiarism: Plagiarism is cheating, caused by lazy or dishonest students who do not properly cite their sources or quotations. It is a serious academic violation and will not be tolerated in this class. Assignments that have been plagiarized will be given zero points and could lead to college disciplinary action.
