

History 3B-50Z is an online class that does not have scheduled meetings. Students can log in any time to do the required week's course work. Students must have access to a computer, the internet, and an individual email address. We recommend a laptop or desktop computer to successfully complete the course; a tablet or phone may not be adequate for all assignments and tests. The class will use the Canvas course management system. See the <u>Student Online Resources hub</u> with extensive information and tips for online learning.

### **Course Description:**

What is "world history"? How is it distinct as a way of studying history from a more traditional method? One of the most exciting (and often controversial) methods of studying history is as a single, global subject, rather than as a set of discrete national experiences. This is a new but challenging

approach to how we do history, and it gives us fresh perspectives when we keep in mind three important themes: change, comparison, and connection.

## **Learning Outcomes:**

Students will demonstrate and apply knowledge of World history from 750 CE to 1750 CE to construct defensible statements of meaning and evaluation about this period's developments. Students will identify, critically evaluate, and interpret World history primary documents from 750 CE to 1750 CE to construct historical analysis. Assessment: written evaluation and interpretation of primary documents.

Class Prerequisites: Advisory: EWRT 1A or EWRT 1AH or ESL 5.

**Discussions**. In order to have regular and substantive interaction (and to get to know each other), we will be holding discussions on designated weeks. You will need to keep up with the material regularly, and not just leave it to the end of the week.

You are responsible for posting at least four (4) substantive posts during the discussion week over the course of three (3) separate days in the week. DO NOT WAIT UNTIL SUNDAY TO DO THE DISCUSSION. See the Discussion Instructions for further detail.

Primary source analysis papers. There will be <u>one</u> short primary source analysis paper due. You have a choice of four different options. Each has a different due date, as listed below. It will be devoted to analyzing primary sources, available from within the paper assignment. Typed, double-spaced, approximately 900-1100 words, to be submitted to the Canvas website. (See instructions below.) The paper must be submitted by 11:59 pm on the date due. The paper is worth 30 points. You may turn in <u>only</u> one paper for credit. For help on MLA formatting, consult the <u>Purdue Owl</u>. Do not use ChatGBT or any other AI program. Do not submit Pages files, links, or other formats that Turnitin does not accept. If the file cannot be analyzed by Turnitin, you will receive no credit.

**Team Presentation.** Everyone will be part of a team and help to produce a presentation on the growth of world trade, focusing on a particular commodity. The team charter (1 point), progress report (1 point), presentation (19 points), team evaluation (3 points) and comments on another team's presentation (1 point) add up to a total of 25 points for the Team Presentation project. See the <u>assignment page</u> for more information.

**History in the news**. To see the connections between the past and the present, you will be following the news over the course of the quarter and posting <u>two</u> articles and commenting on <u>two</u> articles other students have posted. Worth 4 points. See the <u>assignment page</u> for more information.

**Final exam**. The final will be held on **December 13<sup>th</sup>**. The final will consist of <u>one</u> essay question and <u>three</u> short identifications. A study guide will be provided one week ahead of the exam that will consist of four possible essay questions; the instructor will choose one of these for your final exam. You will not have a choice. You will have a choice on the short IDs, but these will only be available on the day of the exam. You will have 24 hours to complete and submit the exam to Turnitin via Canvas. Worth 20 points.

**Assignment policies.** Make-up discussion contributions and late papers will <u>not</u> be accepted. There is no "extra credit" in the course.

Note that no instructor-initiated "W" grades will be issued. It is your responsibility to drop the course in a timely manner if you choose to do so. The last day to drop the class is October 6<sup>th</sup>. The last day to withdraw is November 15<sup>th</sup>.
