ARTS 1A: INTRODUCTION TO THE VISUAL ARTS

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course offers a comprehensive introduction to the visual arts. We will begin by exploring the purpose of art in various times and places. We will then cover key concepts such as abstract and representational art, style and context, and the relationship between form and content. Next, we will examine the visual elements of art, such as color and space, and the principles of design. Finally, we will explore a variety of artistic mediums, techniques, and materials.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOME STATEMENTS (SLO)

Students will analyze the social experiences of artists, demonstrating how artists' relationships with their patrons was a defining factor in the production of works of art.

• Students will demonstrate visual literacy and critical thinking skills by evaluating diverse scholarly perspectives when interpreting works of art.

• Students will investigate the different techniques utilized in the production of works of art through written analysis based on firsthand evaluation of art objects in local collections.
