COURSE DESCRIPTION (De Anza College Catalog)

This course explores visual imagery throughout the world for the purpose of developing visual literacy skills. Works of art will be studied by means of formal analysis, medium, the social experiences of artists, the function of works of art in their original environment, and comparison of works from different cultures. Primary emphasis will be on paintings, graphic works, and sculpture.

Recommended: English Writing 1A or English as a Second Language 5

Attendance is required in this hybrid course which combines on campus meetings with online learning. The class format consists of in-class lectures and quizzes, along with online written assignments, discussions, exams, videos, and readings.

- Students will analyze the social experiences of artists, demonstrating how artists' relationships with their patrons was defining factor in the production of works of art.
- Students will demonstrate visual literacy and critical thinking skills by evaluating diverse scholarly perspectives when interpreting works of art.
- Students will investigate different techniques utilized in the production of works of art through written analysis based on firsthand evaluation of art objects in local collections.

Students must cite any AI-generated material that informed their work by listing the tool(s) and its use under a Works Cited section of the assignment. Failure to give credit to ideas,

sentences or paragraphs not the student's work is plagiarism. I will ask for a student's notes or draft if an assignment shows 30% or higher AI generated. If the student does not have notes, then the student will be asked to rewrite the assignment with an object provided by the instructor. A document which is 100% AI generated is considered plagiarized and no credit. Turn-it-in also checks for the use of AI generated material.

DISRUPTIVE BEHAVIOR

The college will enforce all policies and procedures set forth in the *Standards of Student Conduct* (see college catalog). Any student disrupting the course will be contacted by the instructor, and depending on the severity reported to the De Anza College Maxient for resolution. ONLINE ETIQUETTE

Your conduct in this course should reflect this and your communication should follow standard rules for grammar and spelling and be clear, concise and intelligent. Avoid personal attacks and offensive language.

<u>Have Opinions</u>. Everyone is entitled to have an opinion. In discussion forums, everyone is encouraged to share them.

Respect Disagreement. People have the right to disagree with you. However, disagreement should never be personal. Online discussions are a means to share ideas and practice the skill of persuasion. Persuasive speech cannot be achieved with hurtful, hateful or inappropriate language. Review your posts before you publish and reread them for unintended meanings.

<u>Ask Questions</u>. Cultural influences can influence communication in terms of phrasing and word choice. The lack of visual and auditory clues may affect meaning, as well. Before jumping to conclusions, ask for clarification.

<u>Be Forgiving</u>. For the majority of participants, online communication is straight forward; however, sometimes unintended meanings are conveyed.
